TELEVISION: Pelham couple's entry is among top 55 in CBC's ComedyCoup

## 'Loving idiots' among award contenders

A Pelham couple is hoping their tale of family ties and stupidity will one day be broadcast on television screens across the country.

Blair Wood and his wife Christina Nicolaou have teamed up with a cast of well-known comedians, who include Second City, SCTV and Saturday Night Live among their credits, to create Idiot Parade, Get Stupid.

It's one of more than 230 projects entered in CBC's ComedyCoup, an online campaign that asks fans to watch teaser videos and choose their favourite TV shows.

In addition to writing and producing the show, Wood and Nicolaou are also playing the roles of some of the lead characters, along with comedians Nigel Downer, Tony Rosato, Robert Salvador, Guy Bradford and director Saxon deCocq.

Halfway through the 10-week competition, all but 55 projects

have been eliminated but Idiot Parade continues to be a contender.


Although their show didn't have enough votes to make it into the top 55, Nicolaou said CBC producers liked it enough to keep it in the competition as a "wild-card."

And that was "super encouraging," she added.

But now, Nicolaou is asking the people of her hometown to help support their efforts and visit the Comedy Coup website — comedycoup.cbc.ca/idiot-parade — sign up, watch the trailers and vote for Idiot Parade.

The next round of voting takes place from Nov. 6 to 9. When it's over, the number of competitors will be cut from 55 to the top 15. Nicolaou and Wood also have an Idiot Parade Facebook page they're asking people to visit.

At the end of the competition, up to five projects will be chosen and invited to negotiate a two-year deal with the broadcaster while the producers of the top

program will be given \$500,000 to develop a half-hour show to air on CBC next fall.

The project actually began as a short film, shot at a now defunct sandwich shop in Toronto in the summer of 2013.

"On our first day we shot for 22-hours straight," Wood recalled. "It was awfully grueling."

That film received a nomination for best comedy at the Yorkton Film Festival in Saskatchewan.

"We were put up against these heavy-hitters," Wood said, referring to the quality of films they were competing against. "It was kind of neat. It was like, 'What are we doing here?'"

The nomination gave them the encouragement they needed to work towards developing a televi-

sion series based on Wood's concept of "these three goof-balls, two brothers and a sister."

The characters, Ben, Grace and Dale Belmont, inherit a diner from a grandmother with the stipulation that if they don't continue to run the diner together, their inheritance would instead go to a foundation for horses. Their grandmother, Wood explained, "always thought they were lazy, incompetent and totally stupid, but she wanted to see them make something of themselves."

The catch is, they need to raise \$500 to keep the diner's doors open. While it doesn't seem like a lot of money, it's more than the characters have.

"The three of us are such losers we don't have five bucks between us," Wood said. "My plan is just to take a homeless guy around the corner, put him in a pancake suit

and try and drum up business for the diner."

"It's very slap-sticky," Nicolaou added.

And although the show is entitled Idiot Parade, she said the term is used "with love."

"They're like loving idiots," she said. "They're characters that you root for because they're not mean. They just want to do their best, but their best is never really good enough."

Idiot Parade is one of a few Niagara-produced entries in the competition. Fruit Farm, a comedy based in Niagara-on-the-Lake, has also made it to the top 55.

## Veterinarian recognized for work with animals on reserve

A veterinarian who helps care for animals at the Welland and District Humane Society has been given a national award for her work.

Tammy Hornak, who started an animal rescue charity called Canon's Cause seven years ago, was named the first recipient of the Pets Plus US Community Outreach Award.

"She has done some tremen-

dous work with the First Nations," said Randy Valpy, who heads up the Oakville-based pet insurance company Pets Plus Us.

There were seven awards handed out by the company across Canada this year. More than 160 nominations were entered for the awards and there were 70,000 votes cast in an online poll.

"This is our first year of doing it, but we'll make it an annual thing and make it bigger next year," Valpy said. "I wish we could have

handed out 166 awards because the stories were incredible."

Hornak is a veterinarian based in Caledonia but spends one day a week working at the Welland and District Humane Society. She was nominated by OSPCA CEO Kate MacDonald.

The Canon's Cause organization was started as a way to find adopters for sick and injured dogs and cats that might not otherwise be able to find homes.

Much of the work has involved animals from the Six Nations of

the Grand River. The organization was named after a border collie she rescued that was found with broken back legs and heartworm.

"We use him as our spokesdog because everyone should have the will to live he does in spite of everything he's had to face," Hornak said.

For winning the award, Hornak was given a \$1,500 donation from Pets Plus Us for Canon's Cause.
